

Global Signature Recognition for Nurse Practitioners in California

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Background

- California is one of 15 states in the nation with a regulatory structure that restricts nurse practitioner (NP) practice, including the lack of a global approach to signature recognition
- Global statutes authorize NPs to: "sign, attest, certify, stamp, verify, endorse, or provide an affidavit for any form that a physician can supply, provided it is within the nurse practitioner's scope of practice"

Purpose Statement

 To develop a roadmap to action using a Delphi technique to support legislation for global signature recognition (GSR) for NPs in California

Policy Delphi

Purposive sampling followed by snowball sampling: clinical NPs, nursing faculty, nursing administrators, physicians, leaders in nursing organizations/agencies

Round 1: 21/33 participants (63.64%)

Development of emerging themes


Round 2: 19/21 participants (90.47%) Clarity for effect and relevance

Round 3: 13/19 participants (68.42%) Determine Benefits, Feasibility, Importance, and Confidence

Themes Defining a Roadmap to Action

Barriers to NP practice: GSR

- Removes barriers for NPs
- Facilitates comprehensive care
- Improves patient access/streamlines care
- Enables ability to sign death certificates

Effect on physicians: GSR

- Streamlines physician workflow
- Ensures role of physicians is not diminished
- Improves coordination/efficiency of care and patient, staff, physician satisfaction
- Recognizes the care NPs can provide

Education focus:

- NP training/knowledge of their scope of practice
- Strengthen public knowledge and understanding of NP scope of practice
- NP students receive training/knowledge of NP scope of practice
- Agencies' recognition of NP signatures

4. Cost


- Educating NPs on GSR
